• Ohio Family and Children First (OFCF) is a partnership of government agencies and community organizations committed to improving the well-being of children and their families.



- OFCF started as an initiative of the Office of the Governor in 1991 building upon previous legislation.
- The Ohio General Assembly codified OFCF in 1993.



Ohio Family and Children First Cabinet Council was created in statute (ORC 121.37) in 1993 with the specific purpose:



to help families seeking government services...by streamlining and coordinating existing services for families seeking assistance for their children.

### **FCFC Core Functions/Responsibilities:**

### **Shared Accountability:**

Shared resources, risks, and rewards Planning and annual reporting Fiscal responsibility and oversight State support

## Engaging and Empowering Families:

Family representatives on FCFCs Involving broad representation of families State support

## Coordinating Systems and Services:

Provide service coordination to children with multiple needs referred to FCFC Develop a system of care by identifying gaps and removing duplication of services and efforts State Support



# **Building Community Capacity:**

Shared Planning, Develop a comprehensive plan focused on child well-being priorities & annually report process to the OFCF Cabinet, build FCFC's capacity through Systems of Care Logic Model, County Planning



### **Systems of Care Approach**:





#### Major Focus on:

- Multi-System youth
- Service Coordination
- Trauma-informed
- Wraparound



#### **County FCF Council Membership**:

All county FCFC's work with high-need, multi-system youth's needs to be addressed within a <u>System of Care</u> that must account for:



- Broad array of services/supports available
- Individualized plan
- Least restrictive setting
- Coordinated at both the system and service level
- Family-driven, youth-guided
- Emphasize early identification and early intervention



# WHAT IS THE MULTI-SYSTEM YOUTH CUSTODY RELINQUISHMENT PREVENTION FUND?

The state child-serving agencies jointly developed this program to provide technical and financial assistance to youth and families with complex multi-system needs.

The aim of this collaborative is to prevent custody relinquishment of children and youth solely for the purpose of obtaining needed treatment, and to assist local entities with obtaining services that support children and youth who have been relinquished and are transitioning back to community and/or non-custody settings.



## Funding requests will be authorized only if all five of the following eligibility criteria have been met.

- 1. The child/youth has multi-system needs and is at risk for custody relinquishment or has already been relinquished;
- 2. The applicant has identified availability of local resources (including funding) and/or clinically indicated services to support the child/youth and family;
- 3. Multi-system local and/or regional agencies are working to coordinate care for the child/youth and family;
- 4. Financial resources have been reasonably exhausted (at a minimum: Medicaid, private insurance, Post Adoption Special Services Subsidy (PASSS), and/or county funds); and
- 5. The child/youth will be placed in the least restrictive setting, and the setting will be documented as clinically appropriate to meet the treatment needs of the child/youth and family

#### Funding can be requested by local FCFCs for the following purposes:

Care Coordination/Wraparound to prevent custody relinquishment or for a relinquished child/youth;

In-home and/or community supports to prevent custody relinquishment;

In-home and/or community supports for a relinquished child/youth transitioning back into a community setting; and/or

Residential treatment and/or room and board for treatment to prevent custody relinquishment.



- Opportunities to present complex cases and to receive written recommendations from multidisciplinary experts
- Opportunities to develop the knowledge and skills to manage complex needs in their own communities and to be part of a community of practice

## Systems of Care (SOC) ECHO Case Referral, Presentation, and Recommendations Process

FCF coordinators refer cases to FCF regional liaisons to triage and identify for presentation

Collect and report outcomes

FCFC Coordinator completes SOC ECHO case presentation form and submits to secure location

FCF regional liaison provides technical assistance to local FCFC and refers for ECHO follow-up as needed

CIP works with FCFC Coordinator to prepare information

FCFC Coordinator conducts service coordination meeting with team locally


Local team presents case to SOC ECHO network during a session

CIP shares typed recommendations with FCFC Coordinator / Team

Project ECHO meets Thursdays from 11:30 a.m. – 1:00 p.m. Each week a case presentation will be shared from counties throughout Ohio.
